MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Happy May, Duvall Residents!

Well, let's just say it has been quite the interesting ride over the past two months. First and foremost, I hope you, your friends, family, classmates and colleagues are remaining healthy and strong amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

It certainly has been difficult to follow the Washington State Governor's "Stay Home, Stay Healthy" order as the curve in Washington has begun to flatten. The nice Spring weather has heightened the urge for so many of us to get outdoors and socialize.

I applaud each and everyone of you for doing your part to help our community stay healthy.

As we all know, our small businesses are suffering as a result of mandatory closures, and many members of our community have been furloughed or laid off from work. As a City we are doing what we can, within our resources, to address the growing needs of those in our community.

In that light, we have instituted a "no-shut off" policy for water during the emergency and will be allowing payment schedules for thoseresidents and businesses finding it difficult to pay their bills.

In addition, the City Council approved \$30,000 in emergency funds to support our Human Services grant program, specifically to provide assistance to those in need right now. By the time this newsletter is received, the grant funding should be well on its way to allocation to non-profits that are providing services to our community members in need.

2020 DUVALL FARMER'S MARKET- NEW LOCATION!

Pending final approval from King County, Duvall Farmer's Market is scheduled to open on May 7th, from 3:00 p.m. -7:00 p.m. and run through October 8th. If approval is granted for the opening, all county guidelines will be adhered to, and social distancing measures will be in place.

The new market location is going to be at Taylor Landing (16201 Main Street). This is just north of downtown and offers a lot of room, for a variety of vendors. Additional parking is available at the Park & Ride.

Fresh produce, vegetable plant starts, wine, honey, smoked cheeses, coffee, USDA frozen beef, port, chicken and lamb will be available.

Metro-Duvall Community Van

Metro is allowing more flexibility in the requirements to ride/drive the Community Vans and is focusing on connecting the community to essential services. Metro has currently suspended the fare collection so the community can be transported for free. WAYS YOU CAN HELP

<u>Hopelink</u> -Provides financial, housing, transportation, employment, education and food assistance to local area residents.

Donate to "Greatest Needs" Fund by visiting: www.hopelink.org/how-help-hopelink. Due to the current social distancing requirements, monetary donations provide the greatest flexibility in responding to client needs as they change during this crisis.

Or donate to the "Helping Hands" Fund. Donations are accepted through City of Duvall to provide financial assistance to residents with their utility bills. To donate, simply fill out the box located on the lower front portion of your utility bill and return it along with your payment.

Holy Innocents Church Food Pantry - Provides food and toiletries to anyone in need.

Currently accepting donations of food. Some ideas are: cereal, canned meals, pasta, pasta sauces, dried beans, rice, tomato products, soup, shampoo and toothpaste.
