DID YOU KNOW THAT STORMWATER IN DUVALL AFFECTS PUGET SOUND?

The Puget Sound region extends from the crest of the Cascades and the Olympics to the waters of the Strait of Juan de Fuca and Hood Canal. Stormwater pollution carried into bodies of water within the Puget Sound region has a negative impact on the health of those waters and the animals that live in them. Government regulates industry, but the biggest challenges are problems we create individually – in our yards, with our cars, and around our pets. Approximately 75% of all pollution in Puget Sound comes from stormwater runoff that starts in our neighborhoods.

In Duvall, as in most cities, the stormwater drainage system is not connected to the sewer system. Stormwater is rain that is not absorbed into the soil. It runs over paved and developed surfaces (including lawns) and flows untreated into storm drains, directly into streams, ponds, and the Snoqualmie River which eventually flows into Puget Sound.

Stormwater can contain many pollutants. These include antifreeze, brake fluid, brake pad dust, exhaust particles, oil, pavement particles, tire particles, transmission fluid, fertilizers, weed killers, pesticides, bacteria from dog waste, and soapy water from washing cars.

We can fix the problem. The solution starts here ... where you live and play. You are the solution to the problem. By changing a few of the things you do in your yard, with your car, around your dog, and in your home, you will become part of the solution. Together, we can fix it. You can help save Puget Sound at its source.



LOCAL HOUSEHOLD BATTERY RECYCLING

With the help of King County Local Hazardous Waste grant funds and Duvall True Value Hardware and Garden, the City of Duvall is able to offer a permanent drop off location for household batteries.

The following battery “chemistries” are accepted:

- Alkaline
- NiCad - Nickel Cadmium
- NiMH – Nickel Cadmium and Metal
- Li - Lithium
- Li-ion – Lithium Ion

All batteries should have the chemistry name listed on them somewhere.

Bring your used batteries to Duvall True Value during their normal business hours. A checker will take your batteries for recycling. Please tape the contacts of each battery and separate the different chemistries.

Auto and boat batteries are still recycled at Duvall Auto Parts during normal business hours.

COMPREHENSIVE WATER SYSTEM PLAN UPDATE PUBLIC HEARING

This update includes revisions to service areas, policies, the Capital Improvement Plan, and the financial plan including rate and General Facility Charge adjustments.
